Course Description:

This course will explore the application of research methods to investigate, inventory and document the built resources of an existing historic neighborhood that contains structures from multiple periods of significance.

Purpose of the Course

This course is organized as a service-learning project and examines a variety of data gathering methods, data analysis and synthesis, engagement with community stakeholders, and presentations in public workshops.

Course Objectives

The participants will gain working skills in the following area of historic preservation practice:

- Develop an understanding of the broader development context for the Gainesville area, with an emphasis on the post WWII period.
- Identify and document historic resources within a defined community, while gaining skills in using the Florida Master Site File system and in mapping techniques.
- Engage stakeholders by conducting public workshops, focus groups and interviews.
- Assess the research findings and develop recommendations for preservation strategies for the subject community.
- Provide recommendations for research and inventory work in conjunction with the development of a model process for assessing mid-century modern resources in communities across Florida, for presentation at a professional conference.

Course Presentation and Requirements

Course content is presented in readings, presentations, case studies, and field work. Course requirements include; participation in class discussions, completion of assignments and interim presentations by due dates, completion of field work, data gathering and assessment, participation in community engagement exercises, working as a team member on the semester-long project, and participation in community presentations.

Course Work ProductsSemester-long research project

The Practicum will focus on a semester-long team project. There will be a final presentation to the community. Final work products will include:

- A project report summarizing the team's research findings. Each participant will be responsible for one section of the report, with supporting graphics and references.
- A PowerPoint presentation of the findings from the research project to be presented towards the end of the semester to the community. There will be one community meeting and one in-class

presentation at the end of the semester. There will be a mid-term presentation and a final presentation in class of the research project.

- Other work products include; supporting data, Florida Master Site File and site inventory forms, GIS mapping, photographic and graphic materials, and development of materials for workshops, presentations to the community.
