****Course Description:** This course examines concepts and principles of community risk assessment, planning, and response to fires and natural and human-caused disasters, including National Incident Management System--Incident Command Systems (NIMS ICS), mutual aid and automatic response, training and preparedness, communications, civil disturbances, terrorist threats/incidents, hazardous materials planning, mass casualty incidents, earthquake preparedness, and disaster mitigation and recovery.

****Prerequisite Knowledge and Skills:** None

Purpose of Course: *This course examines concepts and principles of community risk assessment, planning, and response to fires and natural and human-caused disasters, including National Incident Management System--Incident Command Systems (NIMS ICS), mutual aid and automatic response, training and preparedness, communications, civil disturbances, terrorist threats/incidents, hazardous materials planning, mass casualty incidents, earthquake preparedness, and disaster mitigation and recovery.*

Course Goals and/or Objectives: By the end of this course, students will:

1. *Discuss the importance of disaster planning, preparation, and mitigation.*
2. *Evaluate the hazard assessment processes and the role of the firefighter in community disaster planning and recovery.*
3. *Assess hazard response and planning procedures.*
4. *Define the impact of hazard occurrence on community response.*
5. *Define the parameters and effectiveness of an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and its components.*
6. *Differentiate the multilevel agency responsibilities in disaster mitigation.*
7. *Define the relationships between disaster planning, mitigation, and recovery.*

**** How This Course Relates to the Student Learning Outcomes in the FIRE emergency services program:** *Identify and demonstrate proper knowledge and use of comprehensive emergency management/command and control skills in major catastrophic incidents in fire and emergency services.*

****Teaching Philosophy:** I am looking for students to demonstrate a working knowledge of the subject. You need to be creative when you complete your assignments while maintaining a professional appearance of your work. Your work needs to be complete and in such a manner that someone can pick up your document and understand what you are trying to convey. And most of all your work needs to be supported with research and cited in properly in APA format.

Students lose valuable points on assignments because they do not take the time to understand APA style and utilize citations correctly. For each written assignment, include a title page, abstract, and reference page along with the body of content. There is a grading rubric included in the Final Project Module that will provide a guideline as to how written assignments are evaluated.

Additionally, practice using various resources for information other than websites. If you plan on continuing your education at the post-graduate level, you will be required to use journal and peer-reviewed articles so start using a

diverse range of references now. This will also assist in developing more of an analytical style to your writing instead of using personal opinion.

**Instructional Methods: The course is designed for individual and group interactivity. It is important to post and respond to discussion questions in the course within the time frame allotted. This provides a learning environment by networking with other students in the course. The assignments are individual base to give you the opportunity to do a variety of activities, in many cases, similar to what you will be doing in role as a leader in the emergency services profession.

Course Policies:

Attendance Policy: The course is designed in module format. You should check the site at least once a week. **You are required to complete the assignments including discussion questions within the time period designated on the module.
