

Bring your Bicycles to Nantucket.

Nantucket has long been acknowledged to be THE place for boating, bathing and fishing, but because of the sandy roads it would be the last place a man would come to if he wanted to spend his summer vacation in bicycle riding. But with the invention of the pneumatic tire, the objections to the island, as a resort for wheelmen, are done away with. The rider, mounted on a machine with pnoumatic tires, can ride over rough streets, car tracks, and through mud or sand with the greatest comfort and no material lessening of his speed. That fact alone would not make Nantucket especially suitable for cycling, but the advantages of the pneumatic are more than this: the tire is such that it is peculiarly adapted for wheeling on beach sand, and there is the secret of Nantucket's possible future popularity with the cycling


people. A moderately hard beach makes as good a road for the pneumatic as a concrete walk does for the hard tire machine. And what place can boast of longer or better beaches than Nantucket. The island is surrounded by a natural bicycle track without a hill. Could anything be more delightful than a moonlight run from Brant to Eel Point, with a straight, unbroken course stretching out for miles and all the way by the side of the ocean. The pneumatic tire is an improvement in bicycle manufacturing of very recent date, but already it has established itself as the tire of the future. The best racing records have been made on machines equipped with it, and for ease and comfort in riding, it has no equal. The pneumatic is an inflated rubber tube of three inches in diameter. It is because of the elasticity and the amount of surface which comes in contact with the ground that makes it suitable for riding on all kinds of roads.



Tupancy Links

Period of significance: 1921-1953 Owner/ Operator: NCF

Brief: The Tupancy Links was originally part of the Nantucket Golf Course, established in 1921 as the first golf club on the island. This small operation consisted of a nine-hole course mowed by 200 sheep and 50 angora goats. It is now a 73- acre parcel between Nantucket Harbor and Cliff road with miles of walking trails.



Historic Coloured Cemetery O

PIN 50 Project - Nigel Rudolph

Period of significance: 1805

Owner/ Operator: Town of Nantucket **Brief:** Located on Mill Hill, the cemetery was first mentioned in the Nantucket Registry of Deeds on May 5th, 1805, in which proprietors designated one acre of their land for the burial of colored people. After falling into mismanagement, the cemetery was restored and documented in the early 2000's, notating over 120 marked graves and an unknown number of unmarked graves.





Miacomet Indian Burial Ground •

Period of significance: Early 1760s

Owner/ Operator: Town of Nantucket **Brief:** Rediscovered in 1987 during excavation for the construction of new homes, this historic archaeological site was the burial ground for Christian Wampanoag tribespeople who died during an epidemic called "the Indian Sickness" The burial ground was likely used by the Native American Christian meeting house which once stood nearby. It contains the remains of some 222 individuals who died during this period.



Lifesaving Station + Youth Hostel •


Period of significance: 1874-Present Owner/ Operator: Blue Flag Partners Brief: Built in 1874, the Surfside Lifesaving Station was constructed by the U.S. Lifesaving Service to provide rapid response to the frequent shipwrecks off Surfside Beach. Following the creation of the U.S. Coast Guard in 1915, the station was abandoned, and had numerous periods of vacancy, other uses and additions, most recently as a Youth Hostel from 1963-2019. It was purchased in 2020 by Blue Flag Partners with intentions of use as a boutique hotel.

Nantucket Serengeti

Period of Significance: 18th-19th Century Owner/ Operator: NCF

Brief: The Nantucket Serengeti makes up the largest portion of the inland island area known as the Middle Mors, which also includes Altar Rock and the Pout Ponds. The Serengeti is an expansive sandplain grassland and heathland that was used for grazing sheep in the 18th and 19th century. Today it has been restored to its natural form by the NCF and maintained through periodic prescribed burns to remove non-native species.



Sankaty Head Lighthouse


Period of Significance:

Owner/ Operator: U.S Coast Guard, Sconset Trust **Brief:** The Sankaty head lighthouse, located North of the town of Sconset, has continuously served as an aid to navigation since its original construction in 1849. The lighthouse sits on a bluff 158 feet above sea level and has been threatened by major coastal erosion since its inception. In 2007, the over 400-ton lighthouse was moved 405 feet from its original location, to where it stands today, 267 feet away from the edge of the bluff, which loses an estimated 3 feet



annually.
