#### ASHLEY'S MARKET



#### 57 Main Street J. B. Ashley 1910s to 1950s

J. B. Ashley operated this grocery store at the corner of Centre and Main Streets until after World War II, specializing in cutting meat to order (Friday night was the designated night), selling more meat than any other grocer in town. Ashlev's staff wore white butchers aprons and straw boaters. People recall that Ashley's sold "just about everything-chickens, ducks, you name it, and they offered charge accounts."



#### CADY'S FOOD SHOP

38, then 25 Main Street Walter and Anna Cady 1910s to 1950s

This long-running bakeshop and specialty grocery store occupied a building on the north side of Main Street where Erica Wilson's shop is now. Cady's conducted much of its business by making carriage deliveries to private residences and had the bakery in the backyard of their home at 134 Main Street. Bill Haddon ran his photography business in this shop from 1955 to 1970.
