COURSE STATEMENT

This seminar is designed to assist doctoral students in multiple aspects of their career as a student and as an academic. This course addresses various topics, such as identifying research trends, articulating research questions, conceptualizing and writing dissertations, understanding the job market and challenges, preparing for conference presentations and job talks, and other related topics. Overall, this seminar helps students to successfully navigate the doctoral process and enhance communication, presentation and teambuilding skills.

COURSE STRUCTURE:

The course is organized in a seminar format that will involve a variety of teaching styles that include lectures, facilitated discussions, in-class exercises, and student presentations. The course is intended to be a platform for discussion and shared learning. All students are expected to prepare for the learning activities and contribute to the class discussion. The course consists of four elements: reading assignments, in-class discussion, presentations, and writing assignments. Being able to effectively communicate your ideas verbally or in writing will form an important component of this course.
