### **Course Description**

This course will explore the interpretation of tangible and intangible history in Gainesville and the surrounding areas. Focused on sites associated with local Civil Rights and Black Heritage, students will build upon and fill in gaps with current interpretation initiatives. Students will reference existing research from sources such as the Florida Black Heritage Trail, the Fifth Avenue/Pleasant Street Heritage Trail, and Dr. Patricia Hilliard-Nunn's research on area plantations.

By incorporating tools such as augmented reality, SketchUp, and ArcGIS StoryMaps, students will engage audiences who interact with sites and may have little awareness of the layers of history. These approaches will be mindful of accessibility and production costs with a collective product at the end of the semester that can be shared with the community.

### **Course Objectives**

- To learn the principles and elements of effective design
- To gain a basic understanding of Adobe InDesign, Google SketchUp, ArcGIS StoryMaps, and other software to create a visual and interactive narrative
- To practice using these tools for interpreting the history of existing and demolished heritage sites

- Develop professional skills for the interpretation of historic preservation and related fields
- Learn how to communicate to a variety of audiences
- Learn how to provide and receive constructive design feedback
- Collect and evaluate the accessibility and effectiveness of current interpretation methods
- Gain insight into Gainesville's Civil Rights and Black Heritage sites
- Collect and integrate existing oral histories into the interpretation of historic sites

### **Attendance Policy, Class Expectations, and Make-Up Policy**

### ***Class Demeanor***

Students are expected to arrive to class on time and behave in a manner that is respectful to the instructor and to fellow students. ### ***In-Class Recording***

Students are allowed to record video or audio of class lectures. However, the purposes for which these recordings may be used are strictly controlled. The only allowable purposes are (1) for personal educational use, (2) in connection with a complaint to the university, or (3) as evidence in, or in preparation for, a criminal or civil proceeding. All other purposes are prohibited. Specifically, students may not publish recorded lectures without the written consent of the instructor.

A “class lecture” is an educational presentation intended to inform or teach enrolled students about a particular subject, including any instructor-led discussions that form part of the presentation, and delivered by any instructor hired or appointed by the University, or by a guest instructor, as part of a University of Florida course. A class lecture does not include lab sessions, student presentations, clinical presentations such as patient history, academic exercises involving solely student participation, assessments (quizzes, tests, exams), field trips, private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the faculty or guest lecturer during a class session.

Publication without permission of the instructor is prohibited. To “publish” means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.

### ***Student Privacy Considerations***

Some class sessions may be audio-visually recorded for students in the class to refer back and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live (with proper absence documentation). In the event that a Zoom session is offered, students who participate with their camera engaged or utilize a profile image are agreeing to have their video or image recorded. If you are unwilling to consent to have your profile or video image recorded, be sure to keep your camera off and do not use a profile image. Likewise, students who un-mute during class and participate orally are agreeing to have their voices recorded. If you are not willing to consent to have your voice recorded during class, you will need to keep your mute button activated and communicate exclusively using the "chat" feature, which allows students to type questions and comments live. The chat will not be recorded or shared. When class is not being recorded it is expected that all students will have their cameras on and communicate orally. As in all courses, unauthorized recording and unauthorized sharing of recorded materials is prohibited.

If recording occurs in the classroom, the same above applies. It will be announced to the class beforehand if it will be recorded and you may tell the instructor then that you do not wish to be in the recording. A place to sit out of camera view will be provided.

In the event that photographs are taken while in class or on a field trip, permission will be asked before by the instructor of all students. If you do not want to be photographed, you will be kept out of frame.
