COURSE OVERVIEW

Course Description:

Introduces significant theories concerning the interaction of people with environments at various scales. Also explores the corresponding applied environmental design implications of these theories. This survey of normative theories, philosophies and doctrines of environment and behavior serve as an evidence based to support research-based design decisions.

<u>Attributes:</u> Satisfies **2,000 words** of writing requirement. You will likely write much more than 2,000 words during this course.

Course Goals:

- Demonstrate an understanding of relevant theories and their application to interior design.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the value of interior design in contemporary society.
- Exhibit awareness of the influence of furnishings, objects, materials, and finishes on human well-being.
- Utilize a variety of reliable sources of information and research evidence about environment and behavior issues to inform design solutions.
- Demonstrate an understanding of methods for gathering human-centered evidence regarding design (e.g., pre-design and post-occupancy).
- Express ideas effectively in oral, written, and visual communication.

Objectives:

Human-centered Design – Interior designers apply knowledge of human experience and behavior to designing the built environment (CIDA Standard 7).

Student work demonstrates understanding of:

- 7a) theories related to the impact of the built environment on human experience, behavior, and performance.
- 7b) the relationship between the designed environment and human experience, wellbeing, behavior, and performance.
- Student work demonstrates the ability to:
 7c) gather and apply human-centered evidence.

Design Process - Interior designers employ all aspects of the design process to creatively solve a design problem (CIDA Standard 8).

• 8i) Students **understand** the importance of evaluating the relevance and reliability of information and research impacting design solutions

Communication - Interior designers are effective communicators (CIDA Standard 9).

• 9a) Students are **able** to effectively interpret and communicate data and research.

COURSE WORK

Reading assignments and related activities: Students will be given tasks to reinforce comprehension of the subject matter and to provide opportunities for application. These include a variety of exercises, such as a wayfinding activity, trend reports and other assignments, totaling at least 600 words.

<u>Quizzes:</u> Students will take four quizzes during the course to assess reading comprehension and understanding of course content.

<u>Papers:</u> Students will be required to write two papers of varying length (totaling at least 1,400 words) during the semester to evaluate their understanding and application of concepts covered in the course.

WRITING REQUIREMENT

This is a course designed for achieving the UF Writing Requirement (WR) and you will write at least **2,000 words** during the course, although you will likely write more than this amount. Enhancing writing skills is an important component of this course. The Writing Requirement (WR) ensures students both maintain their fluency in writing and use writing as a tool to facilitate learning.

Writing course grades have two components. Professors will indicate whether students met the writing requirement AND will assign a course grade. It is possible not to meet the writing requirement and still pass the class. Students should review their degree audits after receiving their grades to verify receipt of credit for the writing requirement. The instructor will evaluate and provide feedback, on all of the student's written assignments with respect to grammar, punctuation, clarity, coherence, and organization;

- The Writing Requirement (WR) ensures students both maintain their fluency in writing and use writing as a tool to facilitate learning.
- Course grades have two components. To receive writing requirement credit, a student must receive a grade of C or higher and a satisfactory completion of the writing component of the course.
