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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This experiential learning course introduces students to the iconic works of landscape architecture in a U.S. city. This semester the field trip will be to Seattle. Students practice field observation and documentation techniques, engage in team-based learning, and develop an understanding of the breadth of opportunities in landscape architecture.

REQUIRED READINGS AND WORKS

All required readings will be provided on Canvas.

Fees: A list of approved courses and fees is published in the Schedule of Courses each semester. (UF-3.0374 Regulations of the University of Florida). This course includes fees associated with the costs of students participating in the field trip, specifically accommodations, group transportation, and group admission to sites while in Seattle. In addition to fees, students must arrange their own transportation and flight to arrive and depart Seattle at the prescribed times. Students are also responsible for all other expenses while on the trip, including food and incidentals. You will also need a sketchbook.

III. Graded Work

Grading policies

DESCRIPTION OF GRADED WORK

Project 1 – Sketchbook (60% of total grade)

Students will keep a sketchbook during the field trip capturing various drawings and requirements as outlined in Canvas.

Project 2 – Exhibit (30% of total grade)

Following the field trip, students will participate in a gallery exhibit of the field trip and will share their observations with the exhibition audience.

Participation (10% of total grade)

Active engagement in preparation of and during the field trip is essential for successful learning. Students receive full participation grade if they participate in preparatory readings, site visits, group activities, discussions, etc. Participation also includes demonstrating curiosity, a commitment to learning through observation and inquiry, as well as respect for peers and professionals.

Students must attend all pre-trip meetings and actively participate in discussions during field trip. All Rubrics for assignments, projects, and engagement are found on CANVAS
